Dear Parents & Carers

I hope everyone enjoyed the long weekend despite the weather. We have seen some amazing efforts with our 100 fundraising challenge. What a great effort everyone has gone to.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all of you for continuing to send your children to school looking smart and ready to learn during the Covid-19 pandemic. I completely understand the difficulties with buying both uniform and shoes due to the restrictions that have been in place and I have allowed uniform rules to be relaxed to support you with this. Even with these difficulties, the children have always looked very well presented and your support with this is really appreciated.

I am confident that by September, we will all be in a much more stable position as a country with lockdowns put behind us. As we are already gradually returning back to a more normal school life, I hope you can support us again by ensuring that your child/ren are dressed in uniform which adheres to our uniform guide.

I am not suggesting that you rush out to buy new shoes or uniform that your child/ren may grow out of with only weeks left to go of the school year, but if you could please adhere to the uniform guidance as much as possible.

<u>PE</u>

As you will be aware, children have been coming to school in PE kits rather than getting changed. The guidance on this may well change on 17th May or if not, in June. However, in the meantime if again you could adhere to the uniform policy as best possible. Children should be wearing PLAIN white tops and shorts/full length leggings rather than multicoloured or kits with large logos all over. We have reviewed our uniform guide and slight changes have been made to allow black/blue leggings to be worn for PE. These must be plain and FULL length and may also wear black/blue skorts. This also fits in line with Bedale High School's uniform for PE (so I am hoping this will be helpful from a economical point of view for those of you with older children in our school).

It has been so wonderful to see the children working so hard and showing such concentration and attitude in the classroom.



Year 3 News

In the past few weeks, Year 3 have produced some amazing stories based on the story book, Jim and the Beanstalk. It was lovely to see so many children using exciting and adventurous vocabulary along with accurate use of punctuation. Consistency is key now as the teachers are looking to reward children with a handwriting pen. We have begun a long unit of fraction work in maths and the children have started it very confidently and rightly finding fraction learning lots of fun!

In other areas of the curriculum, we have focused our learning on plants, and Bedale's twinned town, Azay-sur-Cher, alongside clay sculptures. If the weather holds out, we are

continuing with athletics and cricket this whole term, so it is important children come to school with the appropriate clothing and a named drinks bottle, ready for action.

We are really enjoying our learning on The Anglo Saxons and The Vikings in Year 4. 
Year 6 News



Jeans are not allowed and the wearing of jewellery and earrings (with the exception of stud earrings, which must be removed for PE lessons) is forbidden. If children are having their ears pierced for the first time, we recommend that this is done in the summer holidays to allow the ears time to heal. If at all possible, it is also always better to have long hair tied neatly for school, again to stop the risk of injury. Bizarre, highly unusual or multi-coloured hair styles are not acceptable, nor are shaved heads. Hair should be one natural colour.
